Dear Parents, Guardians, and Students I write at the end of a tremendously busy and rewarding term with some of the key Barnhill highlights.

Science at Barnhill has been full of hands-on excitement! KS3 students created a universal indicator rainbow, explored cell structures through presentations, and investigated liquid pressure in teams. KS4 students took learning to the next level with a heart dissection, using a tomato to model its structure before examining a real one. With thrilling experiments and real-world connections, Barnhill scientists are turning curiosity into discovery!



Both year 8 and 'A' Level history students deepened their understanding of the British Empire on a visit to the Greenwich Maritime Museum, where they explored how naval dominance shaped history. Exhibits covered the slave trade, Admiral Lord Nelson's triumph at Trafalgar, with hands-on interaction bringing the past to life. A highlight was the auditorium debate, where students engaged in discussions on empire and the slave trade, to sharpen their historical debating skills. An insightful and thoughtprovoking trip!

The MFL department has provided some superb activities this term: Barnhill celebrated European Day of Languages, exploring how cultures and languages shape British society. Students learned about Multicultural London English and how diverse communities influence language. Sixth Formers led a Language Fair, featuring international music, global cuisines, and cultural displays.

Twenty Spanish exchange students from Vigo spent two weeks at Barnhill, attending lessons and forming friendships. They particularly enjoyed technology classes, a subject not offered in Spanish schools. Their visit strengthened international ties, and we look forward to meeting again. ¡Hasta la vista!

Year 8 football team's undefeated streak continues as they dominate at the top of the league. After one math, an opposing coach remarked, "I have not seen a team performance like that from boys that age they really are remarkable!" With just two games left, could they make history?

BM Caterers delivered a cookery masterclass to Year 11 Hospitality & Catering students. They learned expert techniques for making pastry, mayonnaise, and pasta, gaining confidence for their exams. The students actively participated and asked insightful questions—an invaluable experience!

Year 10 Music students visited the Royal Festival Hall to witness performances by the London Philharmonic Orchestra, featuring pieces they study in lessons. Seeing classical music performed live in a world-class venue was an unforgettable experience!

Barnhill's annual talent show returned in spectacular fashion, with singing, dancing, rapping, drumming, and gymnastics lighting up the stage! ALUMNI VISIT

Hardip Begol CBE

Hardip was born and brought up in Hayes, attending Yeading Junior School, Barnhill School (1982-87) and Haydon School Sixth Form. He studied Mathematics and Statistics at the University of Warwick.

He spent nearly two decades at the Department for Education and his senior civil service responsibilities included: special educational needs and disabilities; reform of the National Curriculum, GCSEs and A Levels, and school accountability; and independent education and safeguarding. He was the Director responsible for integration and communities at the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government.



Earlier in his career he trained as a chartered accountant at Deloitte, was a public services consultant at KPMG Consulting and worked at the Prime Minister's Strategy Unit. Hardip was awarded a CBE for services to education in 2017.

He is currently a Board member at: the qualifications and exams regulator, Ofqual; the Oak National Academy; and the Education Policy Institute, the leading education think tank in England. He is a member of the Eden Academy Trust, which has six special schools and settings in Hillingdon and Harrow.

On his visit to Barnhill on 10th February, Hardip said 'What a difference ... 37 years makes. Great visit to my former secondary school Barnhill Community High School this morning. From a low performing school when I left in 1987 it is now Ofsted Outstanding under the leadership of John Jones and Ben Spinks Middlesex Learning Partnership.'



GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS

Banking on making studying pay!

Annamarta Petrilli, from the Financial Market Infrastructure Division at the Bank of England, visited the Year 11 GCSE Business students and spoke to them about the world of payment technologies and the broader financial landscape. The talk was an informative session that linked directly to key curriculum content such as external influences, payment methods, and the UK's financial infrastructure.

Students reflected on the presentation highlighting that the discussion about different forms of payment technology was particularly fascinating. Learning about traditional cash transactions to modern innovations like Apple Pay and cryptocurrencies, the talk detailed the rapid evolution of how we pay for goods and services. One Year 11 student mentioned, "I learned about the rapid increase in the use of Apple Pay," while another reflected on their newfound understanding of how the payments systems work.

The session also enhanced students' awareness of the Bank of England's crucial role in maintaining economic stability. Students were surprised to learn about the processes behind interest rate decisions and the measures taken to ensure secure and efficient payment systems. One student shared, "I now understand more about how the Bank manages the country's finances, and will use this knowledge in my final exams".

The visit aligned with Gatsby Benchmarks 4 and 5 by connecting curriculum learning to real-world applications and offering direct encounters with an industry professional. The students appreciated the practical context provided, with several noting how the speaker's expertise made business concepts more relatable.

The event has sparked interest in finance-related careers, with some students expressing increased curiosity about opportunities in banking and business. "I am more interested in careers in finance now," one student remarked.

Overall, the talk successfully met its learning objectives by deepening students' understanding of payment technologies, illustrating the Bank of England's pivotal role, and inspiring greater interest in the financial sector. The Business department will aim to provide future sessions with industry professionals to continue to enrich the learning experience for students.



DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD

Update & looking ahead

The **Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE)** is a fantastic program that helps young people develop essential life skills, resilience, and confidence through a series of challenges. It consists of four key sections: **Volunteering, Physical, Skills, and Expedition**, encouraging students to step out of their comfort zones and achieve something truly rewarding.

We are delighted to share the **success of last year's cohort**, who took part in a memorable expedition in July. As a result of their hard work and determination, **four students have officially achieved their Bronze Award**, while another **15 are currently pending approval**—a huge well done to all involved!

Looking ahead, this year's Year 10 cohort is off to a great start, with 35 students signed up for the Bronze Award. Their sessions will begin after half term, where they will develop crucial expedition skills, including map reading, route planning, camp craft, and the Countryside Code. These skills will prepare them for their adventurous journey ahead, fostering teamwork, independence, and problem-solving abilities.

SPECTACULAR SCIENCE

KS3 Science Club: Universal indicator 'rainbow'

Students created a rainbow effect using universal indicator, hydrochloric acid and sodium hydroxide. They observed the colour changes when universal indicator was added to different concentrations of hydrochloric acid and sodium hydroxide, consolidating their fundamental knowledge about acids and alkali. Students layered the solution in a measuring cylinder to appreciate the 'rainbow' of universal indicator effect, a great attention-grabbing experience.

KS4 Lesson: Heart Dissection

Students labelled different parts of the heart on the tomato, and this helped them to better grasp the structure and function in a tangible, memorable way. Real-life connections like these make complex concepts accessible and engaging, sparking curiosity and deepening their learning experience.

KS3 Lesson: Cell Models


Students delivered slides of presentation to the rest of their peers. This provided an opportunity to develop oracy. They were able to articulate ideas, develop understanding and engage with others through spoken language.

KS3 Lesson: Students investigation into pressure in liquid

Students worked in small groups to investigate pressure in liquid. They asked questions and developed a line of enquiry based on observations of the real world, alongside prior knowledge and experience.



GOING BACK IN 'MARITIME'

A major part of our study in A Level History at Barnhill is with the course "The British Empire 1857-1965" where we make an introspective and detailed exploration of the Empire that has come to define our very lives in a myriad of clear and unclear ways and of which it's effect can be seen even today. What built this empire, unlike others before it, was it's mastery of the high seas from the 1700s to the very end of the second world war which gives us the saying "Britannia rules the waves".

Our teacher, Mr Khan, took us to the Greenwich maritime museum to further our understanding of the ways in which the Empire functioned throughout various ages and the acts that came to define it. In the museum we explored a diverse array of exhibits which ranged from the tragic history of the transatlantic slave trade, highlighting the cruel and systematic transportation and enslavement of Africans to the New World. Another exhibit highlighted the triumph of Admiral Nelson at Trafalgar where the museum vividly portrayed the horrific conditions endured during this period; offering insight into the harsh lives of sailors during the Napoleonic Wars, both in their living conditions and the challenges of naval combat. Lastly, we explored the mercantile nature of Empire, where hands-on interaction with replica artefacts provided a uniquely informative and valuable experience.

Another excellent aspect of the trip was the hosts' use of the auditorium where information was not only presented but we were encouraged to discuss and debate matters relating to Empire such as the slave trade and the West Africa Squadron. It let us as historians hone our skills in debate with a wide array of knowledge we had received in the Empire course over the past year-and a-half.

To conclude, the group found the trip highly enjoyable and informative for our understanding of Empire as historians, who are dedicated to unravel it's complex and multifaceted past which had a huge impact. **Phoenix 13E**




ILLUSTRATING HISTORY

YEAR 8 SLAVING AWAY IN HISTORY

Year 8 Visited the National Maritime Museum to enrich their learning around the Transatlantic Slave Trade.

The trip to the National Maritime Museum was one to remember! Firstly, let us begin with the journey - we travelled via public transport (TfL), on a 140-route bus and alighting at 'Hayes & Harlington Station', upon which we were separated into two groups, led by Mr. Liddell and Ms. Thomas. We then travelled to 'Canary Wharf' via the 'Elizabeth line' train, after which we switched to a DLR (Docklands Light Railway) train, enjoying the urban city-scape and alighting the train at 'Cutty Sark for Maritime Greenwich', which had been approximately 5 minutes away from the National Maritime Museum, where our exciting adventure truly began.

On arrival at the museum, we were introduced to Kate, who was our primary instructor for the day, within the learning centre of the museum. Our group was informed about the events and objects which had been utilised within the 'Transatlantic slave trade', within a theatre-hall at the museum. Afterwards, we were taken to learn about 'object-handling' with Jo, where we learnt about various fascinating items which had been related to the trade of enslaved people, across the Atlantic Ocean. Furthermore, in small groups, we learnt about the manuscripts and newspapers which had been archived from the 'Transatlantic slave trade', with Sophie and Kate.

Before I had realised, it had already become time for our well-earned lunch-break! After lunch, we walked to the mesmerising galleries, which consisted of informative archives of objects which had been related to the trade of enslaved people and objects across, the Atlantic Ocean, where we analysed various historical records, amazing artefacts and interesting newly-added creations, consisting of the work of various artists, throughout many centuries! This brought us to the end of our visit which we celebrated with a group-photo under the statue of 'King William IV', before travelling back to Barnhill.

Overall, year 8's trip to the 'National Maritime Museum' had been a hugely-enriching and memorable experience, and one which I had certainly enjoyed!

Life Skills Report on visit from Penny, representative from Trinity Homeless Shelter

During the Autumn term, students in Life Skills lead a campaign in support of the Trinity Homeless Shelter. The students presented in assemblies for all year groups to raise awareness of the campaign and the purpose of collecting food items to feed the homeless in Hillingdon.

On Friday the 17th of January 2025 the Year 9 Child Development and Health and Social Care class were visited by Penny, a representative from Trinity who had come in to collect all of the donations. Penny explained that donations of food and clothing are crucial to the c500 families that benefit from the charity on a **daily basis**. She went on to explain to the class that people become homeless for a variety of reasons, such as loss of jobs, relationship breakdowns and mental illness.

The students shared with Penny what they had been studying in class; what cities they had researched and some of their findings. Through their research they discovered that homelessness is a national crisis and the government cannot find enough places to accommodate persons who are made homeless regardless of the circumstances.
